Faith UMC Helpers Lend a Hand

On the 2nd, 4th, and 5th Wednesday you will find Ginny Ryan and Kay Crutchfield getting up very early, and heading straight to their kitchens.

Ginny begins cutting sausage links in half and warming them in her oven. She loads bread, napkins, and condiments into her car. She arrives at the Salvation Army around 6:45am. She immediately begins placing one piece of sausage in a piece of sandwich bread with a napkin wrapped around it.

Kay usually prepares hard boiled eggs and a breakfast casserole while she loads containers of juice and milk in her car.

Items are set up behind a steam table in the SA kitchen. Other volunteers from other churches bring in dayold donuts from Community Bakery, eggs, sliced cheese and extra bread.

At 7:00am women and children come in for breakfast, and then the men are served. Each person signs in, picks up a tray, cup and utensils. They are served food and drinks.

The feeding program and volunteers were organized by Robert Johnston and Matilda Buchanan several

years ago. Originally donuts and coffee were served to the homeless under the Broadway Bridge in cold weather. From there serving places were at the city garage, under city hall in a vacant area, a church, and a large empty house trailer near the bridge.

Unfortunately, Robert died suddenly in September. All are carrying on the work he enjoyed.

Commission on a Way Forward

During the most recent Council of Bishops meeting, the Commission on a Way Forward proposed three preliminary models to help the church address current disagreements associated with human sexuality. The proposed models follow.

- One model affirms the current Book of Discipline language and places a high value on accountability.
- Another model removes restrictive language and places a high value on contextualization. This model also specifically protects the rights of those whose conscience will not allow them to perform same gender weddings

or ordain LGBTQ persons.

Another model is grounded in a unified core that includes shared doctrine and services, and one Council of Bishops, while also creating different branches that have clearly defined values such as accountability, contextualization and justice.

Bishop Mueller invites pastors and lay members of congregations to participate in the *Commission on a Way Forward Town Hall* meetings. Participants will be able to provide feedback and ask questions about the preliminary models. Watch for more information regarding the meetings.
